WILLIAM CULLEN BRYANT 1794-1878

William Cullen Bryant was born in Cummington, Massachusetts, in 1794. When thirteen years old he wrote 'The Embargo,' a satire. This youthful poet was admitted to the bar in 1815 but after ten years he quit his profession and went to New York to reside where he devoted himself te literary pursuits. He was editor of two New York newspapers during his residence there. As a prose writer his style was pure, easy and idiomatic. Few who have been compelled by circumstances to write so much have written so uniformily well. Bryant died in New York, June 12, 1878.

'To the Waterfowl' and 'The Past' are considered among his best poems. 'Thanatopsis,' the unrivaled production of a youth of only eighteen years, was published in 1816, the last stanza being a splendid one to memorize:

So live, that when thy summons comes to join

The innumerable caravan, which moves

To that mysterious realm, where each shall take

His chamber in the silent halls of death,

Thou go not, like the quarryslave at night,

Scourged to his dungeon, but, sustained and soothed

By an unfaltering trust, approach thy grave,

Like one who wraps the drapery of his couch

About him, and lies down to pleasant dreams.
