Dear Miss Henry,

Further to previous correspondence in this matter, I now send you copy Letters of Administration in the Estate of your late father granted to me on the 17th. April 1942. The Grant is limited until such time as you yourself desire to apply for a general Grant but the expense attached to that will not be very much for the reason that the Estate Duty has been paid on the Application for the Grant by me. I have lodged the Grant in the Land Registry and Walter has no authority to sell or dispose of the place now without your prior sanction or permission. I have, however, directed the Land Commission to issue the Receivable Orders for the yearly rent as they have done heretofore, as I consider the least Walter might do is to pay the rents and rates having regard to the fact that he is in receipt of the rents and profits of the holding. I send you a copy of the letter which I wrote to him on the 18th. April. I have made out my costs including the outlay and the total amounts to L12.10.0 and shall be obliged for amount at your convenience. I may mention that included in this is a sum of L5 approx. out of pocket expenses paid by myself.
